

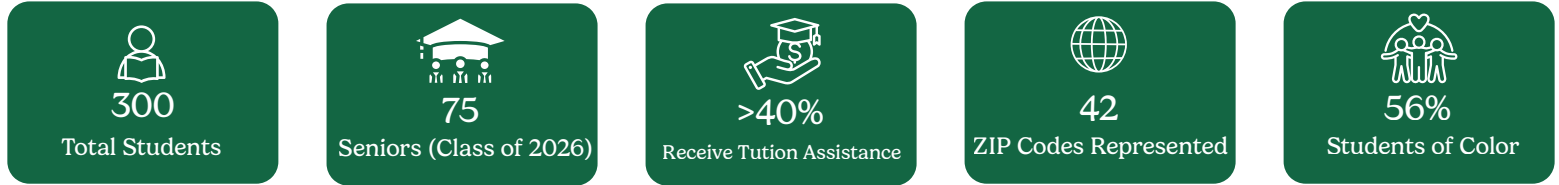


School Profile 2025-26

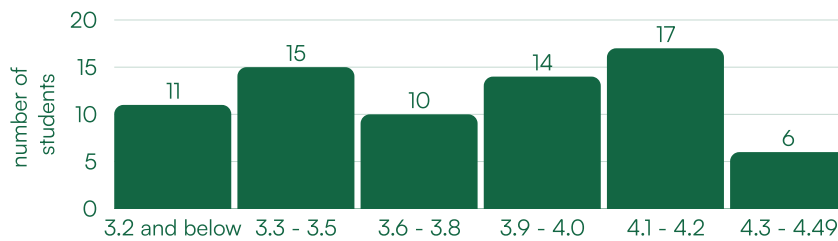
Founded in 1908, Drew is a co-educational, urban, independent college preparatory school serving grades 9–12.

GPA is cumulative from 9th grade and comprises Drew courses only. Weighting adds 1.0 for Advanced and Honors courses. Drew does not rank.

Academics at Drew

Drew students develop the skills and mindsets to apply what they learn in meaningful ways; thinking critically and creatively, expressing themselves with confidence, collaborating with care, and acting with purpose in their communities and beyond.

- English seminars and social studies honors classes (10th, 11th & 12th grades) require a written exam at the end of the prior year, with placement decided by readiness and departmental review.
- Our Math Department provides two honors courses—each requiring an A in the prerequisite, a placement test, and departmental approval.
- Science honors placement is based on previous grades and departmental approval.
- Language honors similarly demand strong prior performance, teacher recommendations, placement exams, and departmental approval.
- Performing and Visual Arts honors courses require departmental approval and/or two years of foundational coursework.
- Interdisciplinary seminars like Voice + Action (English + US History) and the Climate Academy (World History + Biology) emphasize project-based learning.

ENGLISH

4 years required (All English classes have an honors option beginning in 10th grade)

- English 1: Exploring the Self through Literature (9th)
- English 2 (H) or Voice+ Action (H) (10th)
- English Seminar (H) (11th & 12th)

WORLD LANGUAGES

(ASL, French, Mandarin, Spanish)

3 years required, at least 2 of which are consecutive and in the same language.

Honors and Honors Options:

- French 4 (H), 5 Honors
- Spanish 3 (H), 4 (H), 5 Honors

MATHEMATICS

3 years required, 4 recommended
Required Courses – (H) indicates availability of an honors option:

- Math 1 (Algebra I)
- Math 2 (Geometry)
- Math 3 (Algebra II) or Math 3/Precalculus

Electives with Honors:

- Calculus Honors
- Statistics Honors

SOCIAL STUDIES

3 years required including 1 year US and 1 year World.
